Rationale

It means having grand ideals, the desire to achieve great things in response to what God asks of us and, precisely because of this, doing everyday things, all our daily actions, commitments, and meetings with people well. [It means] doing the little everyday things with a big heart that is open to God and to others." - **Pope Francis**

As a Seton Network, we want our students to develop this level of education that Pope Francis speaks about. There is no better way to do this than to attend a high quality, high performing Catholic High School. Navigating the high school process can be challenging. In order to make this process as simple as possible, we created a handbook that walks you through everything you need to know when applying to Catholic High Schools. A large part of the high school process is finding the right fit for your child. In order to help each student finds their fit, we have compiled a descriptions of Catholic High Schools in the area. These descriptions act as a snapshot of all the wonderful things each high school has to offer. We want all of our students to attend a Catholic High School and we hope that this handbook helps achieve that goal. *****Some of the high school data has not been updated, like 2021 dates and tuition please contact the school directly for updated data.**

Common Vocabulary Terms

Before we go into all of the details, it is important to go over some common terms that are used through the high school application process. Below is a list of common terms and what they mean.

Applications: These are forms that are filled out when applying to attend a school. The three most common applications associated with high schools are the application to be admitted, the application for financial aid, and applications for scholarships.

Choice Application: This is an application done through Wisconsin's DPI website and not through the school that allows families to apply for a Choice Seat at a school. Those that apply for a seat through this program are entered into a lottery to determine who receives the seat and funding.

Entrance Exam: This is an exam that students need to take for most high schools. The entrance exam is a component of what high schools consider when they determine whether to accept, waitlist, or deny a student for an admission spot.

Financial Aid: This is what is given by high schools to help families with the costs of attending private high schools. Families must apply for this and the school will determine how much they will offer based on a family's financial need. This does not need to be paid back, but students who receive financial aid will typically participate in a work program associated with the school.

Interview: This is when a high school asks a student to come in to answer questions. This is typically done for students when a high school is undecided about whether to accept them and wants to ask questions about an area of concern with a part of their application.

Letter of Recommendation: This is a formal letter from a teacher, community member, etc. that is written on behalf of a student. These are typically included with an application to be admitted or an application for a scholarship. Each high school has different rules on letters of recommendation ranging from required to not looked at.

Open House: This is when a high school opens its doors to prospective families to tour and learn more information about what they have to offer. These are typically done in late October for each private high school.

Placement Exam: Placement exams are exams taken at the end of 8th grade year to determine whether a student should be placed in an accelerated class when they start their Freshman year. This is common for students looking to start at a higher Math or Spanish level.

Recommendation Form: These are forms that students typically give or send to their teachers to fill out on their behalf. All high schools have recommendation forms that are filled out by teachers. Most schools now have students send the form electronically to teachers, but there are some schools that still have paper copies. These are different from letters of recommendation.

Scholarship: These are financial awards given to students who excel in a certain subject area and/or meet a particular need. These are different for each high school and typically have certain requirements in order to qualify for it.

Shadowing: This is when a student spends a day at the high school following another high school student around through their class schedule. These are typically available to 8th grade students during the fall semester and 7th grade students during the spring semester.

Suggested Timeline

The following is a suggested timeline to ensure you and your child are able to obtain the necessary information to make an informed decision on where to apply and ensure that all the required pieces to attend are submitted.

7th Grade

- Summer before 7th Grade: If possible/available, attend summer programs and camps that the high schools you're interested in offer.
- Throughout the school year: Attend different events offered by the school that interest your child including sporting events, theatrical performances, etc.
- Late October: Attend the Open House presentations for the high schools you are interested in to gain information about each school.
- Spring Semester: Have your child shadow at different high schools so they can gain an understanding of the school and what a typical day is like.

8th Grade

- Summer before 8th Grade: If possible/available, attend summer programs and camps that the high schools you're interested in offer.
- Throughout the school year: Attend different events offered by the school that interest your child including sporting events, theatrical performances, etc.

- Fall Semester: Have your child shadow at different high schools you are going to apply to to start determining their top choice, second choice, etc.
- Middle September: Start asking teachers to write a letter of recommendation for you.
- Late October: Submit applications and send recommendation forms to teachers.
- Late October-Early November: Take Entrance Exams for different high schools.
- Late November: Submit applications for financial aid.
- Early February: Submit application for Choice Seat.
- Late April: Make final decision on what high school to attend.
- Late May-Early June: Take Placement Exams for accelerated classes.

7th Grade

Grades

Grades on a report card are one of the major components that high schools look at when considering a student for admission. High schools will receive the 7th grade report card for each student. This means that it is important that students put their best effort forward with their grades and take ownership of their academic work. Grades on a report card can be a make or break part of a student's application.

Tardies/Absences

Tardies and absences can be a strong positive or one of the biggest red flags for a student's application. Being in school is always important, and high schools look at this component carefully since it is difficult to make up missed time in high school. Most high schools ask on recommendation forms whether a student has excessive absences and/or tardies. Having an excessive number of absences and/or tardies can prevent a student from being admitted. It is important to make sure to limit the number of absences and tardies a student has during their 7th and 8th grade year. It will prevent this red flag for applications and your student will have an easier time learning material in school.

Behavior

7th grade is a very important year not just for academics, but for behavior as well. High schools are looking to accept students that are leaders, dedicated, self-motivated, driven, respectful, and responsible. They are also looking for students who demonstrate Christ-like behavior. It is important that these behaviors are demonstrated because on high school recommendation forms, teachers will be taking note of the student's behavior. High schools have said that these teacher comments are an important piece to the application process.

MAP Scores

MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) tests are interim assessments that are administered three times per year in math and English/Language Arts in the form of computerized adaptive test (CAT). MAP tests are constructed to measure student achievement from Grades K5 to 12 in math, reading, language usage, and science and are aligned to the Wisconsin State Standards. High schools use MAP scores, along with GPA to make admission decisions. High schools look at MAP scores to help with acceptance decisions.

Forward Exam Scores

The once a year Forward Exam includes a series of achievement tests aligned to the Wisconsin Academic Standards in ELA and math for grades 3-8. Forward Exams are delivered online. For each grade and subject, there are three cut scores that distinguish between performance levels: Level 1: Below, Level 2: Basic, Level 3: Proficient, and Level 4: Advanced. The Level 3 cut score marks the minimum level of performance considered to be "proficient" for accountability purposes. High schools will look at the 7th grade scores.

Student Essay Prep

It is never too early to start preparing the student essay part of a high school application. Students should start creating a rough draft of what they want to say in their essay. Once they have their thoughts down, be sure to have them save their essay in an area where they will be able to find it next year.

Tracker of Achievement

High schools want to get a snapshot of who each student is. The best way to see this is through student achievements. Students should start compiling a list of activities they are currently or have been involved in,

awards received, and volunteer hours. These will be important when highlighting all that they have accomplished when applying to high schools as an 8th grader. See appendix for an exemplar.

Attend Events at Schools

As a 7th grader, it is important for students to start finding what high school is right for them. This includes looking at school size, academics, extracurricular activities, as well as student community. One great way to get a feel for a high school is to attend events hosted by the high school. If your son/daughter is interested in drama club, they should go see the school play! If your son/daughter wants to play on the soccer team, they should go see a game! In addition, high schools in the area host numerous summer classes that middle schoolers can attend. Attending these summer classes not only allows your child to interact with other students they might not know, but it also allows for them to see the high school that is hosting the class and get familiar with the school. There are countless opportunities to start getting a feel for the high school life outside of shadowing like sports camps, drama and art camps and more.

Open House

All area Catholic High Schools hold Open Houses in the fall

(<u>https://schools.archmil.org/Schools-home/Events.htm</u>). 7th grade is the time to pay a visit to these open houses so you can get a feel for your high school options prior to starting shadow visits in the spring. While the Open House does not replace a real day shadow visit, it does offer you the opportunity to see the building, meet current teachers, students and parents, and ask general questions about programs and extracurriculars. Waiting until 8th grade to visit open houses for the first time is simply too late. Applications for area high schools are due in the fall so you will want to start 8th grade with your list of top high school choices.

Shadow Visits

Spring of the 7th grade year is an ideal time to schedule Shadow Day Visits at area Catholic High Schools. A Shadow Day Visit allows your child a chance to spend a full day with a current high school student; attending classes, eating lunch, and getting a feel for the school. This is a critical piece of the high school application process. The Open House is just an introduction. The Shadow Visit is your child's opportunity to get a real look inside our area Catholic High Schools. Every high school has set Shadow Visit dates so be certain to visit the websites for the high schools you'd like to visit, find a date that works, and schedule your visit online. This is an important 7th grade step in the high school admissions process.

Budgeting for School

It is no secret that Catholic High Schools can be pretty expensive. Since this is the case, you should start budgeting for this expense sooner rather than later. In addition to including this expense in your personal budget, start looking into ways to cut the expense of high school by looking for scholarships that your son/daughter could qualify for. Ask the high school your child is interested in if they offer financial aid and what that process looks like. Finally, look into applying for a Choice Seat. **Know that just because your son/daughter has a Choice Seat at their current school does not mean they will automatically be granted a Choice Seat in high school.** High schools only have a limited number of Choice Seats available and therefore use a lottery system to give students access to these seats. Be prepared and not scared when it comes to financing a Catholic Education.

8th Grade

Grades

While 7th grade is an important year for grades, 8th grade is equally important. High schools will receive the report card for the first grading period and use this as a component of whether to admit a student or not. High schools will also collect the report cards for other grading periods. This is so high schools can ensure that students that have been accepted are continuing to put forth effort in their academics. A significant drop in grades can result in a loss of an admission spot. This is especially true for students that have been admitted conditionally. Students that have been admitted conditionally will have to meet certain grade requirements in order to hold their spot.

Tardies/Absences

Tardies and absences can be one of the biggest red flags for a student's application. Being in school is always important, and high schools look at this component carefully since it is difficult to make up missed time in high school. Most high schools ask on recommendation forms whether a student has excessive absences and tardies. Having an excessive number of absences and tardies can prevent a student from being admitted. It is important to make sure to limit the number of absences and tardies a student has during their 7th and 8th grade year. It will prevent this red flag for applications, and your student will have an easier time learning material in school.

Behavior

Just as in 7th grade, it is still a very important year not just for academics, but for behavior as well. Again, high schools are looking to accept students that are leaders, dedicated, self-motivated, driven, respectful, and responsible. They are also looking for students who demonstrate Christ-like behavior. It is important that these behaviors are demonstrated because on high school recommendation forms, teachers will be taking note of the student's behavior. High schools have said that these teacher comments are an important piece to the application process. Teachers are still in communication with the high schools that students applied to and will share any uncharacteristic changes in behaviors.

MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) tests are interim assessments that are administered in the form of computerized adaptive test (CAT). MAP tests are constructed to measure student achievement from Grades K5 to 12 in math, reading, language usage, and science and aligned to the Wisconsin State Standards. High schools use MAP scores, along with GPA to make admission decisions. High schools look at MAP scores to help with acceptance decisions.

Student Essay

High schools are looking for several things in the student essay part of the application.

- Students should be sure to fully answer the question develop their thoughts around one topic.
- Students should be sure to have well-formed sentence structure vary how they start their sentences and combine short sentences with a conjunction to form different lengths of sentences.
- Students should be sure to use proper spelling and grammar.
- Students should be sure to have consistently correct punctuation no run-on sentences and where they would take a pause to breath, place a punctuation mark!
- Students should be sure to write legibly and neat if writing by hand.

Attend Events at Schools

Once students have started to narrow down their list of potential high schools, a great way to find the right school is to get a feel for each of the high schools. The best way to do this is to attend events hosted by the high schools. If your son/daughter is interested in drama club, they should go see the school play! If your son/daughter wants to play on the soccer team, they should go see a game! There are countless opportunities to get a feel for the high school life outside of shadowing. In addition, high schools in the area host numerous summer classes that middle schoolers can attend. Attending these summer classes not only allows your child to interact with other students they might not know, but it also allows for them to see the high school that is hosting the class and get familiar with the school.

Open Houses

All area Catholic High Schools hold Open Houses in the fall

(<u>https://schools.archmil.org/Schools-home/Events.htm</u>). While the Open House does not replace a real day shadow visit, it does afford you the opportunity to see the building, meet current teachers, students and parents and ask general questions about programs and extracurriculars.

Shadow Visits

Fall of the 8th grade year is an ideal time to schedule Shadow Day Visits at area Catholic High Schools. While you may have done Shadow Visits in the spring of 7th grade, perhaps there were schools you didn't get to visit or you want to spend one more day at your top choice to make sure it is still where you want to be.

A Shadow Day Visit allows your child a chance to spend a full day with a current high school student; attending classes, eating lunch and getting a feel for the school. This is a critical piece of the high school application process. The Open House is just an introduction. The Shadow Visit is your child's opportunity to get a real look inside our area Catholic High Schools. Every high school has set Shadow Visit dates so be certain to visit the websites for the high schools you'd like to visit, find a date that works and schedule your visit online. This is an important step in finalizing your high school decision.

Applying to Schools

It is strongly recommended that all 8th graders apply to 2-3 Catholic High Schools plus at least 1 public/charter school as a safety net in case they are not accepted at an area Catholic High School or if the cost of Catholic High School tuition is prohibitive. Catholic High Schools admission departments want to work with families so be persistent if financial assistance is needed; however, in the event a Catholic High School doesn't pan out, you will want to have some say in what public high school your child may attend. Early admission applications for MPS and area public school districts are due in the Fall just like the Catholic High Schools.

Letters of Recommendation and Recommendation Forms

Letters of recommendation and recommendation forms are very important parts to a high school application. Most high schools will accept both a letter of recommendation as well as a recommendation form. In order for a high school to get a complete understanding for each student, it is highly recommended that they send both when applying. Be sure your son/daughter informs the person that is writing the letter of recommendation and gives that person at least two weeks to write a well written letter on their behalf. Know that whoever is writing the letter of recommendation will be honest about your student's academic performance and behavior. Once your son/daughter receives the letter of recommendation back from the person writing it, be sure to read through it and double check for spelling and grammar mistakes. If edits need to be made, have your student politely inform the person who wrote the recommendation so that these edits can be made. When filling out a

recommendation form, be sure to give the person filling out the form at least three days to complete. Students should not wait till the last minute to do these very important parts of the application!

Deadlines

When going through the process for applying for high schools, it is important to pay attention to deadlines. Each school has different deadlines for when their applications for admittance, application for financial aid, and applications for scholarships are due. Make sure necessary materials are turned in by these dates to ensure that your child's application will be given the due diligence it deserves. One deadline that is universal is the Choice Application deadline. This must be completed in early February in order to ensure your child is considered for a Choice Seat. Also pay attention to when deadlines are for signing up for entrance exams, choosing classes, etc. If you have questions about a school's deadlines, go to their website or call the school for clarification.

Entrance Exams (Fall)

Students going to a private school are normally required to take an Entrance Exam. A majority of the Catholic High Schools use the High School Placement Test (HSPT). This test is designed to measure the academic abilities of incoming freshman in the areas of Math and English Language Arts (ELA). Students choosing to go to a public or charter school may have to take an entrance exam that is only for that particular school. Results of the HSPT are normally shared with local area private schools. If you have questions about whether a high school will share test results, contact the high school. Check high school websites for dates and times of exams. Practice material for the HSPT is located on the Web or a major bookstore. It is recommended that you study before taking the HSPT to ensure yourself a good score. Ask the high school if they share entrance exam scores with other high schools, so your child does not have to take an entrance exam at each school. Some high schools award scholarship dollars to high scorers in the entrance exam administered at their school.

Interviews

On some occasions, high schools will ask for an applicant to come in for an interview. This is normally done when there is a concern over part of the application such as grades, behavior, absences, etc. This is an opportunity to show a high school admissions team that they can be an asset to them. Some questions that students in this position should be ready to answer include:

- Why do you want to attend our high school?
- What are your goals?
- What do you offer to our high school?
- Any questions that relate to an area of concern mentioned above

Choice

Just because your child is accepted at an area Catholic High School and is a current Milwaukee or Wisconsin Parental Choice Participant, that is not a guarantee that they will secure a Choice Seat at a Catholic High School. It is imperative that families understand this. Unlike many of our Catholic grade schools that operate at a high Choice percentage, the high schools have fewer Choice Seats available thus resulting in lengthy waiting lists. It is important that Choice families fill out the <u>online Choice application</u> (Milwaukee or Wisconsin) on or before the February 20th deadline. Be sure to select all Catholic High Schools you are interested in when filling out the application to increase your odds of being selected at at least one Catholic High School. If your child has an older sibling that is a current Freshman, Sophomore of Junior at a Catholic High School and they have a Choice Seat, as long as your child is accepted at the high school, they will be guaranteed a Choice Seat.

Back-up Plans

Students are encouraged to apply to 2-3 Catholic High Schools of their choice to ensure that they have multiple choices to a great Catholic education. Your backup plan should also include 1-2 public or charter schools to further ensure acceptance to a high school of your choice. If something comes up during the application process, be sure to communicate this with your child's 8th grade teacher or counselor as soon as possible. This will create the best opportunity possible to explore all possible options.

Placement Tests (Spring-Summer)

Students take placement tests as another measure to find strengths and weaknesses. This is a valuable test because it provides a greater insight on what courses you will take during your Freshman year of high school and ensure help in areas in need and a successful beginning to high school.


